Speakers

Susanne Doblecki-Lewis, MD, MSPH, FIDSA

Dr. Susanne Doblecki-Lewis is a professor of clinical medicine and chief of the Division of Infectious Diseases at the University of Miami, and an infectious diseases clinician in the Jackson Memorial Hospital. Her clinical and research focus is on improving access to HIV and infectious disease prevention strategies for underserved populations. She is the founder and director of the University of Miami Mobile PrEP Program, and the UM Rapid Access Wellness Clinic, which provides HIV, sexually transmitted infection, and pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) prevention services at locations throughout Miami-Dade County since 2018. In 2021, this program expanded to also include rapid entry into HIV care, ensuring that people newly diagnosed with HIV or re-engaging in care are able to start antiretroviral treatment within hours to days of their diagnosis. The Mobile PrEP Program has served more than 1,800 clients.

Tai Few, MDiv

Mr. Tai Edward Few is the associate director of the Denver Prevention Training Center (PTC), housed within the Public Health Institute at Denver Health and Hospital Authority. The Denver PTC is funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to provide technical assistance to state and local health departments in the western part of the United States. The Denver PTC also provides technical assistance to organizations conducting HIV clinical testing and prevention for persons with HIV. Mr. Few is a nationally recognized public health thought leader with 20 years of experience working with health care and community-based organizations to provide culturally responsive and relevant care, and anti-racist care. He also has experience managing local, state and national public health programs that support health and racial equity, and directing capacity-building projects of national importance.

Jennifer Janelle, MD

Dr. Jennifer Janelle is an associate professor of medicine at the University of Florida in Gainesville, where she specializes in the care of people with HIV and sexually transmitted infections. She is the principal investigator of the North Florida AIDS Educations and Training Center, which is a partner in the Southeast AETC. She provides infectious diseases clinical care at the University of Florida and HIV care for people in rural Ryan White funded clinics in Sumter, Putnam and Columbia counties. In addition to her clinical role, Dr. Janelle is the associate program director for the infectious disease fellowship at the University of Florida.

Kurtis Mohr, MD, AAHIVM

Dr. Mohr is a public health medical officer for the California Department of Public Health for the STD Control Branch, where his work focuses on doxy-PEP, Hepatitis C and the sexual health of the LGBTQ+ and transgender communities. He joined California Department of Public Health in November 2022 after an HIV Fellowship with Kaiser Permanente in San Francisco and Oakland in California, and nearly a decade of primary care work for Premise Health at the Walt Disney World Resort in Orlando, Florida.

Aaron F. Osborne, MD

Dr. Aaron "Fletcher" Osborne is a proud Jacksonville native, who majored in chemistry at the University of Florida, and completed medical school at the Florida Atlantic University's Charles E. Schmidt College of Medicine. He went on to complete his pediatric residency at the University of Louisville, and joined the pediatric infectious disease fellowship at the University of Florida College of Medicine – Jacksonville in 2021.

Melanie Vega, MD

Born in Miami, Florida, from Nicaraguan immigrants, Dr. Vega has always been interested in science throughout schooling, and was a pre-med major at the University of Chicago and at Florida International University. She worked as a research assistant at the Substance Use and HIV Neuropsychology Lab at FIU. Then, she went to medical school at St. George's University in Grenada, and completed a residency in pediatrics at Mercer University in Macon, Georgia. Currently, Dr. Vega is a pediatric infectious disease fellow at the University of Florida College of Medicine – Jacksonville.

Brandi Williamson, MBA, BS

Ms. Williamson serves as the Regional Early Intervention Consultant and STD Surveillance Manager at the Florida Department of Health in Duval County. She received her bachelor's degree in health and human performance from East Carolina University, and a master's degree in business administration from the University of Phoenix.
